DRATION COMMITTEES. DEATH OF MR. COURTENAY CROKER.

We announce with very sincere regret the death of Mr Courtenay le Poer Trench Croker, D.L., which occurred yesterday morning at his residence, Ballynagarde, Co. Limerick, Li in his 83rd year. He was the fifth and th only surviving son of Capt. Edward Croker, fa D.L., J.P., 17th Lancers, of Ballynagarde, whose wife was the sixth daughter of the first and last Earl of Rathdowne. Croker married in 1882 Mary, youngest de daughter of the late Ven. Charles Hare, Archdeacon of Limerick. He was a Deputy Lieutenant and a Justice of the Peace for to the County of Limerick. From 1882 till 1911-in which lafter year he retired-he was an auditor of the Local Government E Board, Ireland. Mr Croker was the embodiment of courtesy and kindliness of he was For many years heart. elected unanimously Chairman of County Infirmary, and when years ago it was proposed to amalgamate the hospital with a county institution he took up a strong position in opposition, and was successful in urging on the County Council to adopt a policy in accordance with his views. In the Limerick Branch of the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals he took the keenest interest and was frequently present in the District Courts in connection with presentation of certificates and other awards to Civic Guards for meritorious services for the protection of dumb animals. Mr Croker was a keen He owned some well-known sportsman. chasers in his time and up to quite recently, and he was one of the Directors of the Race Company. Again, he took a prominent part as a member of the Horse Show Committee, and, in short, his services in social life marked him out as a gentleman who was ever ready to help in any useful or philanthropic work for the benefit of city or county. His passing has created a void in our midst which it will be difficult to fill, and the sincerest sympathy of a wide circle of friends in Limerick and far outside it is extended to his widow in her hour of trial. The funeral is announced to be private.

At a meeting of the Corporation Committees last night, on the proposition of Mr M. Keyes, T.D., a vote of sympathy was passed with the relatives of Mr Croker.
