IOCESAN CHORAL STIVAL.

Bathing Fatality in the Mulcaire.

A very sad fatality occurred in the Mulcaire River, near Plassy, on Sunday afternoon. Richard Cross, aged 23, residing at Singland, near the city, was having a bathe when he got into difficulties, and though two of his companions made a gallant effort to rescue him he lost his life. The body was soon after recovered and conveyed to Barrington's Hospital morgue, and an inquest was held on Monday at the County Courthouse by Dr M. R. Cleary, Coroner for East Limerick.

Supt. Hayden, Newpallas, conducted the enquiry.

Evidence of identification was given by Michael Cross, brother of the deceased.

William Minihan, Hazel Avenue, Mulgrave street, city, stated, accompanied by William Berkery and the deceased, he went to bathe in the Mulcaire River on Sunday evening. Cross got into difficulties, and Berkery and witness went to his assistance. They caught him by the head and legs, but were unable to effect his rescue, as deceased grappled them by the legs and pulled them under the water. They were obliged to let go and swim back to the bank, when they raised the alarm. In a short time three men came along in a boat.

James Clancy, Browne's Lane, Edward street, occupant of the boat, deposed to diving into the river and recovering the body, which was taken to the bank and later removed to Barrington's Ho pital.

Dr T. Morris, House Surgeon, Barrington's Hospital, stated that death was due to asphyxiation, caused by drowning.

The Coroner, in recording a verdict in accordance with the medical testimony, commended the action of Clancy, who was practically an invalid, suffering from the effects of a fractured leg. The Coroner said he also wished to warn people not to swim in the particular place where the tragedy had occurred. He had been informed that it was a most dangerous place for bathers. He sincerely hoped that his warning would have the desired effect.

Deep sympathy is extended to the family of the deceased young man in their grief.

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
