DEATH OF MR. M. J. COSTELLO.

The death took place at his residence,
Mount Vincent Terrace, O'Connell Avenue,
this morning of Mr. Michael J. Costello.
The deceased, who was 72 years of age, had
been ill only a couple of weeks. He was
district agent for the Great Western Rail-
way in this city from 1921 to 1929, when
he retired on pension on completion of 54
years' service with the company. A native
of Waterford, Mr. Costello was held in the
greatest respect by the company, to which
he had given faithful service, and by the
public with whom his duties brought him
into contact. He was an exemplary citizen,
affable and courteous, and his demise has
been learned with sincere regret by a wide
circle of friends, who will extend sympathy
to his sons, Mr. D. C. Costello (Great
Western Railway, Waterford) and Rev. M.
G. Costello (St. Joseph's Seminary, Surrey),
and the other members of his family.
