DISTINGUISHED LIMERICK MAN DEAD.

Sir Joseph Nunan, K.C.

Sir Joseph Nunan, K.C., of Parkside
 Avenue, London, S.W., died in St Bartholo-
 mew's Hospital, London, yesterday, aged 61.

Sir Joseph was taken ill after he had
 lunched in the Middle Temple dining hall,
 on Monday, and he was removed to hospital.
 The cause of death was cerebral
 haemorrhage.

Deceased was born in Limerick City,
 being the son of Mr Patrick L. Nunan. He
 was educated at Crescent College, Limerick;
 University College, Dublin, and T.C.D., at
 all of which he had a distinguished course.
 He was called to the Bar at King's Inn,
 Dublin, in 1898, and at Gray's Inn, London,
 in 1906. He took silk in 1913.

He held important posts in the British
 Colonial Service, and at the end of the war
 he was British representative on the
 Reparations Commission at Vienna, and
 Chairman of the International Conference
 dealing with National Debts within the
 Austro-Hungarian Monarchy.

Since 1925 he practised at the English
 Bar, and was honorary LL.D. of Dublin
 University.
