DEATH OF MR. JOSEPH PICKERSGILL,

Master of Co. Limerick Hounds.

We announce with regret the death of Mr Joseph Pickersgill, Master of the County Limerick Foxhounds, which took place at a London Nursing Home last Monday. The deceased gentleman only took ill last Friday, and the cause of death was double pneumonia. He was eldest son of the late Mr J. Pickersgill, of Barden Hill, Weetwood, Leeds, and before he took over the Limerick Mastership two years ago, in succession to Mr H. A. Pearse, he was Master of the Galway Blazers. Under his leadership the Limerick Hunt made remarkable progress and attracted visitors from across Channel in considerable numbers. Mr Pickersgill was a fearless rider to hounds, and a fine judge of a hunter. The kennels at Adare, where he resided during the hunting season, were his chief concern, and the pack was a credit to his care and efficiency. He was a prominent figure at the Limerick Horse Show, and it was in the main due to his efficiency that we had the inter-Hunt competition at these fixtures. His demise, at a comparatively early age, is a distinct loss to the County Hunt, and in the great bereavement that has befallen his widow and children they will have the sincere sympathy of the members of the Hunt and the residents of Adare, where he was very popular.

Mr Pickersgill was captain of the Cambridge University polo team in 1911 and 1912, and Master of the Cambridge Diag. He was a former Master of the Essex and the Mendip Hounds.

The interment took place to day at Lawnswood cemetery.
