

## COUNCIL.

A quarterly meeting of the Council was summoned for next Tuesday evening at 8 o'clock. The principal business to be transacted is the appointment of the members of the Old Age Pensions and Charitable Committees, and the members of the Harbour Board, the St. John's Hospital, the St. Vincent's Hospital, and the Child Welfare Committees, in addition to the members of the Charitable Trusts Trustees. The Council is also under consideration a letter from the Government regarding the appointment of a permanent Town Clerk.

## THE LORD MONTEAGLE.

The Harbour Trustees passed a vote of condolence to the relatives of the late Lord Monteagle, who was seven years of age, and tribute was paid to his valued services to the improvement of the Harbour, especially as regards the building of the new pier now in progress. Almost the last work in preparing a Proclamation was, it was pointed out, done by the late Mr Wilkinson.

## GIRL'S FATAL INJURIES.

### Struck by Lorry.

Mr J. S. McNeice, Coroner, held an inquest at the County Infirmary touching the death of Betty Doody (13), Kilconlea, Abbeyfeale, who was fatally injured on Wednesday by being knocked down by a motor lorry, stated to have been driven by Mr C. Brodrick, and which collided with a horse and cart near Abbeyfeale.

Mr D. E. Doody, father of the child, gave evidence of identification.

Dr M. Bartley, House Surgeon, County Infirmary, stated that on examination of the body he found that there were external injuries and rupture of the spleen, which were the cause of death.

The Coroner adjourned the inquest to an indefinite date, pending criminal proceedings.
