At a meeting of the Corporation im-
provements Committee on Wednesday night
the Mayor presiding,

A letter was read from the E.S.B., stating
that at present the Board had under review
the question of the rates and charges for
electricity in Limerick, and at the moment
they thought that no useful purpose could
be served by sending a representative to
discuss the matter, as was suggested by the
Corporation.

The Mayor said that he recently saw in
the Press that there was to be a further
reduction of the electricity rate in Dublin,
and he considered that the treatment
meted out to Limerick in the matter was
deserving of the strongest condemnation.
They had got no reduction whatever, and
were paying 50 per cent. more for electricity
than Dublin. He thought that a very
strong effort should now be made to secure
fair treatment for Limerick. Dublin had
very low charges already, and Limerick was
entitled to a reduction before the Dublin
charges were again reduced.

The matter then dropped.
