They had got no reduction whatever, and were paying 50 per cent, more for electricity than Dublin. He thought that a very strong effort should now be made to secure fair treatment for Limerick. Dublin had very low charges already, and Limerick was entitled to a reduction before the Dublin charges were again reduced.

The matter then dropped.
