FALL FROM SCAFFOLDING AT ASKEATON.

Carpenter's Death.

A very sad fatality occurred on Monday morning at Askeaton, when Thomas Ryan, aged about 50, a native of Baunreagh, Askeaton, fell thirty feet from a scaffolding of a tower which was being constructed in connection with the Askeaton water supply scheme, where he was engaged as a carpenter. He received severe injuries and was immediately attended by Dr Fitzgibbon, Askeaton, who ordered his removal to the County Hospital, Croom, but Ryan was dead on admission.

Subsequently an inquest was held by Dr Clery, Coroner, East Limerick.

Evidence was given in which it was stated deceased lost his balance on the scaffolding and fell a distance of thirty feet to the ground.

A verdict of death from shock, following injuries to the spine and head, was returned.

The Coroner tendered sympathy with the relatives, and the Garda authorities joined in the expression. Deceased leaves a widow and eight children.

The funeral on Tuesday to Mount Pleasant Cemetery, Askeaton, was very large and representative. The clergy present were:—Very Rev. Canon Reidy, P.P., Askeaton; Rev. Fr. Wilmot, C.C., do.; and Rev. Dr. Cowper, C.C., Limerick.
