Limerick Vouchers.

Vouchers to the value of £300 approxi-
mately were issued at the Employment
Exchange, Limerick, yesterday and to-day
under the free meat scheme. This repre-
sents the distribution of 1,400 lbs. of meat
to the beneficiaries, who received their sup-
plies from the city victuallers.

It was learned that generally the price of
meat has not so far been increased to the
ordinary consumer.

DEATH OF WELL-KNOWN ATHLETE.

Mr John O'Grady.

A well-known and popular personality,
Mr John O'Grady, passed away at his
residence, St. Alphonsus Terrace, yesterday
morning, after a brief illness. He was aged
42, and in his day was an athlete of out-
standing reputation in field events—slinging
the 56lbs. between the legs, and over the
bar, and throwing the 28lbs. from the
shoulder. He competed at every athletic
meeting of importance in this country, and
also figured at cross-Channel fixtures. He
held the World Championship in these
events, and represented Ireland at the
Olympic Games in Paris some years ago.
His last public appearance was at the
Tailteann Games in Dublin in 1928.

Mr O'Grady was a man of powerful
physique, standing over six feet high, and
of an unobtrusive and very kindly manner.
Up to the time of his death he occupied a
position in the Limerick County Council as
inspector of rate books, in which capacity he
enjoyed the confidence of his employes.
His untimely passing has been heard of
with deep regret throughout the country,
and sincere sympathy is extended to his
widow in her keen sorrow.
