THE LATE MRS BLOOD, WILLOW BANK.

The death, which occurred at her resi-
dence, Willow Bank, Kilmurry, Limerick,
on Friday, September 21st, of Agnes,
widow of Dr Charles Holcroft Blood,
M.D., has occasioned deep regret amongst
a wide circle of friends in this and
adjoining counties. Mrs Blood, who had
been in delicate health for a considerable
time past, was daughter of the late Very
Rev James Hastings Allen, Dean of Kil-
laloeh, and for many years Rector of Clonlara.
She resided at Willow Bank for something
like forty years, and was beloved by all who
had the pleasure of knowing her, while she
was a life-long friend and benefactor to the
poor, by whom she will long be remembered
with respect and esteem.

The funeral, which took place on Monday
last to the family burial place at Kilna-
soolagh, Newmarket-on-Fergus, Co. Clare,

in the surrounding districts, a fitting
tribute to her memory, and of sympathy
with her bereaved relatives.
