brothers, Jack and Laurick Ouwney, Aun lunkard-street, Limerick, visitors for the day, immediately dashed into the sea, and with the utmost difficulty they succeeded between them in reaching the exhausted girl and taking her to the strand. The incident was witnessed by large numbers, who paid tribute to the courage and promptitude with which the brothers Cowhey acted, had it not been for which the girl would most certainly have been drowned. It is understood that the girl was also a visitor from Limerick and was known to the young men. The rescuers spent the rem inder of the day in a local hotel while their clothes were being dried, before they caught the train back to Limerick.

DEATH OF MR J. P. O'MAHONY, RATHKEALE.

Mr John P. O'Mahony, P.C., Rathkeale, who voted in the County Council elections for the Rathkeale area on Wed. collapsed in the street and was taken to his home where he died in a short time. The deceased, who was about 65 years of age, was proprietor of the firm of McDonnell and Co, seeds and hardware merchants. He was for upwards of twenty years a member of Limerick County Council, and unsuccessfully contested the Dail elections as a Treaty candidate in 1923. Mr O'Mahony was unmarried, and his death in such tragic circumstances is greatly regretted in Rath. keale and district.
