DEATH OF MR JOHN E. HEALY

Editor of the "Irish Times."

The death took place at a nursing home in Dublin yesterday afternoon of Mr John E. Healy, Barrister-at-law, Editor of the "Irish Times" since 1907, and for 30 years Dublin correspondent of the London "Times." Born in Drogheda 62 years ago, the only son of the late Mr James S. Healy, Solr., of that town, he had a distinguished course in Trinity College, Dublin, and as a journalist was a brilliant and outspoken writer, whose articles both during the pre-Treaty troubles and since then aroused much criticism, but at no time would he consent to have a guard placed by the authorities over his home or office. His journalistic work occupied by far the greater portion of his time and thought, and outside it his main interest lay in literature. In 1923 the University of Dublin conferred on him the honorary degree of Master of Arts.

The late Mr Healy had family connections with Limerick. In 1899 he married Adeline Alton, daughter of Mr James Poe Alton, and sister of Professor E. H. Alton, T.D. F.T.C.D. He is survived by her and by two sons, Flight-Lieut. Ernest Alton Healy, Royal Air Force, and Flight-Lieut. L. E. Healy, A.A.F.
