## Motor Cycle Fatality

## City Lad Killed

Mr J S MacNeice, solr., Deputy Coroner, with a jury, held an inquest at Barrington's Hospital to day touching the circumstances of the death of John Charles Capsey who died on Monday evening as a result of a motor cycle accident on Good Friday at Newcatalle, Limerick.

Inspector Lyons, co, conducted the inquiry.

Mr Charles H Capsey, Hamilton House, Roxboro' Road, Limerick, identified the body as that of his son, aged about 21 years. The deceased was a mechanical engineer and was in good health that morning. The machine was in splendid order and had a new lamp. Deceased had four year's experience of motor cycling.

Mary Crosgh stated that she was in com-

pany with Christopher McNaosra on the Nemgh Limerick road at a place called Newcastle, and heard the noise of a motor cycle coming behind. When the machine came absent it struck McNamars and knocked him. Witness also tell. The machine continued for a few yards and then fell at the right hand side of the road, Sho could not say if the bicycle struck the wall. There were rough, loose stones against the wall where a footpath had been, There was a light on the motor cycle. McNamara was badly injured and was in hospital. Mr D. Kiely, and Mr. McMahon, Limerick, took the two men to hospital.

Dr. J. Morris, House Surgeon, Barringten's Hospital, said deceased had cuts on the right side of his face. He was unconscious for three days until death, which was

one to fracture of the base of the skull.

Mr 1) Kiniy, Shannon street, said the boy was sying four feet from the wall. He was encouncing when picked up and bleeding. Witness removed the cycle from off decased and conveyed him to hospital.

Guard J Brophy gave evidence of iden-

tification.

The Coroner said McNamara was still in hospital. His evidence was not necessary. The jury found that death was due to

fracture of the base of the skull.
