

Death of Mr J O'Halloran

With deep feelings of sincere regret we announce the death of Mr Jas. O'Halloran, which took place at his residence, Keeper View Terrace, Athluskard street, on Thursday morning. Deceased had been seriously ill during the past month, and the end came peacefully. He was one of the oldest members of the Typographical Society in Limerick, and spent his apprenticeship and lifetime in the employment of the "Limerick Chronicle" office, of which newspaper he had been foreman since 1897, only retiring some eighteen months ago through ill-health. During his long association of 67 years with the journal he had given loyal and faithful service to his employers. In his trade he was a thoroughly skilled craftsman, ever considerate to the men under his charge, and was obliging and courteous to everyone who came into contact with him. He was endowed besides with a literary taste, and had a fund of keen wisdom and humour which ever made his companionship enjoyable and desired. He was a well-known angler, and was regularly seen on the Shannon in his days of health plying rod and line at Corbally. Deceased was also Freeman of the City, an honour in which he took justifiable pride. His demise will be regretted by a large circle of acquaintances, and by none more so than by his trade colleagues, who had ever a deep and kindly regard for a good-natured friend and fellow-worker. We join with the many expressions of condolence offered to his family circle in their bereavement.

The remains were removed to St. Mary's church on Thursday evening, followed by a very large concourse of mourners. The funeral took place to Mount St. Lawrence Cemetery at 3 o'clock on Saturday from the church.
