We regret to announce the death, which occurred yesterday at the residence of his niece, Mrs Donal Guina, Rathdene, Ennis Road, Limerick, of Dr P. B. Molony, late Medical Officer of Murroe and Cappamore dispensary district, a position which he filled for the long period of 34 years up to 1932, when he retired. He was a native of Cappanuke, Murroe, and formerly resided at Dun-na-nDroichead, Cappamore. His kindly, sympathetic, and unassuming manner won for him the respect and esteem of all classes in the district, and the news of his demise has been heard of with deep regret, and widespread sympathy is expressed with his relatives. BRITISH ROAD DEATHS.

158 Last Week.

The British Ministry of Transport announce that last week the number of deaths from road accidents was 158, while the injured numbered 3,769. In the previous week the figures were 187 and 3,800 respectively.

In the metropolis 35 were killed and 1,016 injured, compared with 36 killed and 1,019 injured the previous week.
