LIMERICK MAN'S DEATH IN ONE-DAY CLEANING ENGLAND.

The death took place at his residence, 1 Balmore Road, Sittingbourne, Kent, on the 28th ult., of Mr Richard Joseph McCutcheon, eldest son of the late Mr John McCutcheon, merchant tailor, Limerick. The sad news will be heard of with regret by many old friends in this city. He had been some six weeks ill, and was aged 59. He left Limerick thirteen years ago, and carried on a successful business in Sittingbourne, where he was highly esteemed. He was a keen Churchman, and two years ago, as we learn from the "East Kent Gazette," he organised a successful fete, and raised a fund from which the Lady Chapel in the Parish Church of St. Michael's was furnished. He was a founder of the Sittingbourne Bowling Club. A touching reference to his death was made by the Vicar, Rev. Dr. A. Jones, and Mr W. L. Grant, Churchwarden. Mr McCutcheon was married in 1901 to a Sittingbourne lady, the youngest daughter of the late Mrs William Jeffery, of Key street, and with his widow and daughter deep sympathy is expressed in their bereavement.

The church flag was flown at half-mast during the week as a mark of respect to the memory of the deceased. The funeral, which took place last Thursday at Sittingbourne, was very largely attended, the officiating clergy being the Vicar of St. Michael's, Rev. Dr. A. Jones, and Rev. O. Brazier, who was formerly a curate in Limerick.

The chief mourners were the widow and daughter of the deceased, Mr J. McCutcheon, Limerick (brother), Mr and Mrs A. Marsh (brother-in-law and sister-in-law), Mr and Mrs Pedler (do.), Mr W. Jeffery (brother-in-law), Mr H. Godden (niece), Mrs J. Jeffery and Miss Dorothy Jeffery (sister-in-law and niece), Mrs W. Mills (cousin), Mr A. Watts, Mrs H. Tebble, and Mr M. Doran (friends).
