ADARE MYSTERY.

Tragic Discovery.

A sad story was revealed at Adare on Saturday, when an inquest was held into the circumstances of the death of Samuel Ruttle, aged 51, a former rate collector for the Limerick County Council, who was found dead in the Deerpark, near Adare, under mysterious circumstances.

Deceased had been missing since Tuesday from his home in Adare, where he was living with his wife and four children, and a search was instituted by the Guards, with the help of a number of civilians. In a thickly wooded portion of the Deerpark, and at a place more or less unfrequented, deceased was found in a crouching position. Beside him was a bottle containing a small quantity of disinfectant. He appeared to be dead for some days.

The body was removed and the Coroner communicated with. Following evidence of identification at the inquest, evidence was given that deceased was last seen alive at 6.20 o'clock on Tuesday morning last. He was unemployed for some time previous. No cause could be attributed in connection with the death.

A verdict of death from taking disinfectant was returned.

Sympathy was extended to the relatives by the Coroner (Dr Clery), Dr Costello, and Sergt. Reidy.

The funeral took place on Sunday, and there was a large and representative attendance.
