## DEATH OF MRS HANCE.

Many old friends have learned with regret  
of the death, which occurred at 5 Richmond  
Terrace on Wednesday, of Mrs Elizabeth  
Hance, the last surviving member of an old  
Limerick family, the Goggins, who genera-  
tions ago were printers and publishers in  
this city. Her brother was Mr Stephen  
Byrom Goggin, for many years secretary  
in the firm of J. P. Evans & Co., and her  
nephew was the Rev. Bertie Goggin, at one  
time curate at Ballycotton, Co. Cork, both  
of whom predeceased her very many years  
ago. Mrs Hance attained the great age of  
95 years, and almost to the last possessed her  
faculties unimpaired. She was a gifted  
vocalist and pianist, and at one time of her  
life sang before Queen Victoria in the  
Crystal Palace, as a member of the Phil-  
harmonic Society. Kindly and hospitable, she  
was very highly esteemed by all who knew  
her, and though living in retirement for  
years past, she was not forgotten by old  
friends in Limerick and elsewhere. The  
remains were removed to St. John's Church  
on Thursday evening, and yesterday at noon  
the funeral, which was attended by several  
mourners, took place to the family vault in  
St. John's Churchyard. The officiating  
clergymen were the Dean of Limerick and  
Rev Treasurer Abbott. The Archdeacon of  
Limerick was also present.

It may be added that Mrs Hance was a  
granddaughter of Captain Taylor, of Holly-  
park, Co Limerick, who as an officer of the  
28th Regiment took part in the defeat of  
Napoleon on the Nile, and lost an arm in  
the engagement. Meeting George the Third  
in Hyde Park one day whilst his Majesty  
was riding he saluted with the left hand,  
having lost his right, and held the reins in  
his mouth, and for this gallant action the  
King put him on full pay.
