DEATH OF MR P. E. O'DONNELL, SOLR.

In the city and county deep regret is felt at the death which occurred at his residence, 8 Glentworth street, yesterday morning of Mr Patrick E. O'Donnell, solr., at the age of 68. He had been ill from pneumonia for some ten days, and his demise has come as a shock to the citizens, by whom he was very popular and highly esteemed. He was a son of the late Mr P. O'Donnell, High Constable of the Barony of Glenquin, Killeedy, Ashford, County Limerick; was admitted a solicitor in 1890, and subsequently enjoyed an extensive practice. He was a member of the Council of the Incorporated Law Society, and a delegate from Munster. He was also President of the City and County Bar Association; was an old member, and in early life an oarsman, of the Limerick Boat Club, of which, in later years, he was President. In social life he took a prominent part in his time. He was a follower of the County Hunt in former years. He evinced a keen interest in the work of the Limerick Branch of the British Legion. He was father of Mr T. E. O'Donnell, solicitor, an ex-President of the Irish Amateur Rowing Union, and a prominent oarsman at Irish regattas.

One of the late Mr O'Donnell's brothers is the Right Rev. Monsignor O'Donnell, P.P., V.G., Rathkeale. Another is Major-General Sir Thomas Joseph O'Donnell, K.C.I.E., C.B., of the Royal Army Medical Corps, who had a distinguished war service, was a Director of Indian Medical Services, and organised the Ambulance Corps during the European War. Mr O'Donnell was brother-in-law of Mr J. P. Hartigan, the well-known auctioneer, and racing official.

Deep sympathy is expressed with the deceased's widow and family in their bereavement.

The remains will be removed to St. Michael's Church at 7 o'clock this evening, and the funeral will take place to Mount St. Lawrence Cemetery after 10 o'clock Mass to-morrow.

CITY COUNCIL.

HOUSING SCHEME.

Palmerstown Clearance.

The Mayor (Councillor Dalton) presided at a special meeting of the City Council on Tuesday night.

Also present—Aldermen T.D., J. Reidy, T.D., J. McCullors, P. F. Quinlan, P. J. Donnellan, J. Dalton, M. E. Dalton.

The Mayor said that the Council had convened to make a clearance of Section 6 of the Housing Act, 1924, regard to the Palmerstown. The City Manager had the order read, and it was necessary to pass a formal resolution to put it into effect.

On the proposition of Mr Dalton, the resolution was seconded by Mr Dalton, the resolution was carried, and the seal of the Council.

With regard to housing, the City Manager said that the Mayor was going ahead with the clearance of economic and uneconomic land for the development of the city. The clearance would be opened on Friday. In the meantime preliminary work was being done in Killalet and other areas. As possible the entire scheme would be pushed ahead, and the Mayor considered that much progress had been made.

Alderman Donnellan said that he would like to receive information regarding the operation of the Local Loans Act, as far as advances for the clearance by individuals was concerned. He said that the information he had received was that a great number of people were not satisfied with the operation of the scheme, owing to the delay in the clearance. He was aware that owing to the delay money was not forthcoming, and that contractors had to suspend work on the houses, not having funds to carry the structure to the completion. He said that the Council could receive the money, and that the City Manager, who was responsible, but something should be done to expedite the payments. The City Council and the Utility Society were asked to make advances to complete the clearance of the fields.
