## COUNTY LIMERICK DOCTOR

Injured in Indian Air Crash.

A Reuter's Karachi message of Sunday  
says:—Flying Officer K. N. Smith, of the  
R.A.F., was killed when a machine piloted  
by Dr. J. D. Leahy crashed this evening  
near the Officers' Mess at Drigh Road. Dr.  
Leahy was injured and has been taken to  
hospital. The machine belonged to the  
Karachi Air Club.

Dr. Leahy, who was piloting the aero-  
plane, is a native of Newcastle West, Co.  
Limerick.

A Dublin doctor who studied with him  
at Clongowes Wood College, Co. Kildare,  
stated on Sunday night that Dr. Leahy was  
very popular with all his colleagues. Dr.  
Leahy was at Trinity College, Dublin,  
before entering the British Army.

Mr Wm. Leahy, his step-brother, is a  
solicitor in Newcastle West, where his  
uncle, Mr Roche, of the Square Hotel, also  
resides.

## DEATH OF DR LEAHY.

We regret to learn from a Reuter's  
telegram that Dr Leahy died yesterday.  
He was a squadron leader in the medical  
branch of the R.A.F., and was aged 42.

Dr Leahy had been four years in India,  
with the Royal Irish Fusiliers during the  
War, being awarded the M.C. His home  
was in Boundary street, St. John's Wood,  
London.
