DR M. J. NOLAN'S RESIGNATION.

Tributes by Co. Down Mental Hospital Committee.

The resignation of Dr M. J. Nolan, brother of Mr Wm. M. Nolan, late Town Clerk of Limerick, from the position of Resident Medical Superintendent of County Down Mental Hospital, after the long service of 42 years, was announced in the last issue of the "Chronicle."

Dr Nolan is a well-known specialist in mental diseases, and on the occasion of his retirement in Co. Down high tributes were paid to his long and valued services to the Institution by the Managing Committee, which has accepted his resignation with sincere regret.

Senator J. Hill Dickson, J.P. (presiding), said he was sorry the Chairman of the Committee, Viscount Bangor, was not present to voice the feelings of the Committee on receiving the resignation of Dr Nolan, who had been one of the landmarks of Co Down for the past 42 years, during which he had been Resident Medical Superintendent of one of the institutions in the county of which they were justly proud. Dr Nolan's reputation as an authority on mental diseases was not confined to Co. Down, or to this institution, for across the water he was well known as a specialist.

"This institution is a monument to his zeal and foresigh", and he built it up with the greatest care, so that it is as near to perfection as possible. To generations to come the County Mental Hospital will always be associated with Dr Nolan."

In losing Dr Nolan they were losing an outstanding figure in the administrative life of Co. Down and North Ireland.

Mr Blane said Dr Nolan for many years had been the mainspring of the institution, which he had brought to great perfection. In losing him they were losing a great friend.

Mr Hugh Brown said that ever since he could remember, Dr Nolan's name had been associated with the institution. The person who followed him would have a hard job to live up to the high ideals which he had set.

He swam out, and succeeded in bringing Michael to the shore in an exhausted unconscious condition. Artificial respiration was applied, and he was brought round in about half ap
