THE SHANNON DROWNING FATALITY.

Identity Established.

The body of the man recovered from the Shannon at Russell's Quay last Saturday morning has been identified as that of James O'Donnell, a small farmer, of Holy Cross, Kilmallock. Identity was established to the Civic Guards by Joseph Conway, a nephew of the deceased. He stated that his uncle left home at 6.30 o'clock last Friday evening. He was suffering from nervous trouble, and was under medical care.

At the adjourned inquest to-day by Mr J. S. McNeice, Deputy Coroner, a verdict of death from asphyxia, due to immersion in the river, was recorded.
