STREET BONFIRES.

Child Fatally Burned.

An inquest was held in Barrington's
Hospital on Moaday by Mr J. S. McNeice,
Solicitor, Deputy Coroner, on Catherine
Cullen, aged 9½ years, Watergate, City, who
died in the institution on Sunday morning
from burns sustained on Saturday evening.

Evidence of identification was given by
Mary Cullen, sister, who stated she was at
home at 12.30 p.m. last Saturday when
her sister rushed in crying out "Mary, Mary,
I am burning." Her clothing was on fire
at the back, and witness tried to extinguish
the flames. She succeeded, and then had
the child removed to Barrington's Hospital.
Some short time previously some papers,
sticks, and rubbish were burging outside
the house, with a number of children
playing in the vicinity. These included
the deceased, who was trying to re-ignite
the smouldering embers, when her clothing
became ignited.

Dr Stephen McDonagh, House Surgeon,
Barrington's Hospital, stated that death
was due to shock, following extensive
burning of the back

Inspector Lyons, who conducted the
enquiry, stated that the practice of lighting
bonfires in the streets was becoming far too
common, and the citizens should co-operate
with the Gardai in stamping out the
practice.

The Deputy Coroner recorded a verdict
in conformity with the medical testimony,
and repeated the necessity for suitable
playing grounds for the children of the
city.
