**THE LATE SIR WILLIAM LINGARD GOULDING, BART.**

The death of Sir William Lingard A. Goulding, Bart., of Hilbrook, Castleknock, Co. Dublin, which occurred in London on Thursday, has been heard of with much regret in Limerick, where, as Chairman of the Irish Wire Products, Ltd.; which is setting up a factory at the dockside, with a capital of £125,000, his name had come prominently before the local public for some time past; indeed it is but a short time since he visited Limerick in connection with the enterprise. Sir Lingard had also family ties with Limerick. In 1908 he married Nesta Violet, second daughter of the late Mr Justice Wright, of the High Court of Justice in Ireland, grand-daughter of the late Sir Croker Barrington, Bart., of Glenstal Castle, Co Limerick, and niece of Sir Charles Barrington, now residing in England.
