COUNTY LIMERICK MAN'S DEATH IN ENGLAND.

Identified Three Months After Finding of Body.

Three months after his body was picked
up on the L.M.S. railway line at Souldrop
(Beas.), Lawrence McArdle (26), Market
Harborough, Leicestershire, a native of Co.
Limerick, was identified on Saturday by his
wife,

At the inquest on McArdle an open
verdict was returned after all efforts to
establish his identity had failed and he was
buried at Souldrop.

Mrs McArdle, it is understood, was under
the impression that her husband was search-
ing the country for work. It was not until
a friend a day or two ago expressed the
possibility that the man found on the line
was her husband that she reported the
matter to the police. She went to Souldrop
with her father and identified the clothing
as that of her husband.

The couple were married last December.
