# Death of a Killarney Man in Limerick.

Wm. O'Leary, aged 58 years, a native of Killarney, died in Barrington's Hospital, Limerick, yesterday from injuries sustained last week by being knocked down by a lorry at Patrickswell.

An inquest was opened and adjourned last evening pending criminal proceedings against the driver of the lorry. The medical evidence showed that death was due to rupture of the kidneys.

The death took place at his residence, Hardingrove, Croom, yesterday, of Mr John Coleman, at an advanced age. The deceased was an extensive farmer and took a keen interest in public affairs. He was for many years a member of Limerick County Council down to the election of 1920, when Sinn Féin came into power. Mr Coleman was for a number of years Chairman of Croom-District Council, and possessed a great grasp of local administration. All through life he was a supporter of the Nationalist cause and a follower of the late Mr John Redmond. He was father of the Rev. Patrick Coleman, C.C., St. John's Cathedral, with whom and the other members of his family sincere sympathy will be extended in their bereavement.
