We earnestly pray that such deplorable happenings have now ceased, and that in North and South, a return to former friendly relations, will speedily come for the common good of our native land.

FATAL ACCIDENT.

Engine Driver's Death.

William Nolan, engine driver, of Prospect Hill, Edward street, who met with a serious accident at the railway terminus on Sunday evening, succumbed to his injuries at Barrington's Hospital last night.

Nolan, who was driving an excursion train from Killaloe, is believed to have slipped off the engine on to the permanent way, and one of his arms was severed from the elbow.

An inquest was opened this evening and adjourned for the attendance of the Inspector of Factories.

Vigorous Condemnation by Catholic Clergy.

The rioting was referred to at various Masses on Sunday morning and was strongly condemned.

Rev. Father Fitzpatrick, preaching in Joseph's Church, said the clergy had learned of the attacks on Protestant houses with a deep sense of shame and sorrow. The responsible were guilty of a great wrong against justice and charity and to think that the outrages had been perpetrated in the name of Catholicity was shocking, disgusting and sickening. The clergy, he said, appealed to the citizens to express their abhorrence of what had taken place and to make sure that such a thing could not occur again.

The attacks on Protestant property would seem, as a reprisal for what was taking place in Northern Ireland, for which their Protestant fellow citizens were in no way responsible. They should all express their sympathy with Protestant neighbors.

Fr. Moriarty spoke in similar terms at St. Michael's Church, and Fr. O'Donoghue at the O.S.A., in the Augustinian Church.

Condemnatory references were also made at Devotions in all the Catholic churches last night.

Some one hundred extra Guards were drafted into the city to deal with any possible further outbreaks on Sunday night, but, happily, everything passed off without incident.

In the Redemptorist Church.

Preaching in the Redemptorist Church, Very Rev. Father Kerr, C.S.S.R., Rector, who is a Belfast man, said:—

"It must have been with a deep sense of pain and humiliation that you heard this morning of the disgraceful scenes which occurred in the city last night, when the property of Protestant fellow-citizens was destroyed, the windows of their homes smashed, and of their places of worship.
