OBITUARY.

Mrs H. Wingfield Yates.

I know that many friends in Limerick
City and County have heard with deep
regret of the passing from this life of Mrs
H. Wingfield Yates, formerly of Rosbrien
House, Limerick, wife of a former popular
County Inspector, H. Wingfield Yates,
Royal Irish Constabulary.

She had to undergo a serious operation
on July 11th at a Weymouth nursing home.
A distinguished surgeon, and a London
specialist, and qualified nurses were there.
The operation was successful, but the
patient never regained consciousness, though
the doctor fought all night to save her.
She faded away without pain on July 12th.
In her last letter to me, written a week
before the operation took place, she sent her
love to all old friends in Limerick, and
kindest wishes to everyone she knew in
pro-Treaty days. Her death is a great
shock to her husband and son, Major L.
P. Yates, and her schoolboy grandson; also
to her sisters, and nephews and nieces, to
me and all friends of hers here at Cappagh,
and in city and county of Limerick. She
was a high-minded, good woman, loved by
all, and exceedingly popular at Glyn Pedr,
Llanbedr, Crickhowell, Breconshire, where
they lived for over ten years, until this
summer. Major L. P. Yates is Chief Con-
stable of Dorsetshire, and Mr and Mrs
Wingfield Yates were staying with him and
his wife when she was taken to the Wey-
mouth nursing home for the operation.

Mrs Yates, on her mother's side, belonged
to several Limerick County families. The
Westropps, of Ballysteen, which means also
her descent from the Odells, of The Groves,
Ballingarry. Colonel Odell, of The Groves,
represented this county in the old Irish
Parliament for thirty years in the 18th
century. Odell-Westropp is correct, though
not always used now-a-days.

We all send our deep sympathy to Mr H.
