BISHOP OF KILLALOE

And Italo-Abyssinia Crisis.

At Killaloe Synod, the Bishop, Dr. Patton, said he thought the world outlook was unspeakably sad. Mussolini was plainly resolved on war with Abyssinia at a time when the conscience of Christendom was shocked at such a prospect. Mussolini believed that by conquest he could invest Italy with immortal glory. The mind of all that is best in Christendom believed that he would cover himself and his country with immortal shame, even if he succeeded in quelling the people of Ethiopia by employing the horrors of modern scientific warfare against a comparatively defenceless reople. How far climatic conditions, with their attendant difficulties of disease and death, might modify the glamour of his expected triumph none could tell, but gloy cin never emerge from such a campaign of slaughter, and the Christian world cannot afford to be in lifferent, but must press on towards a peaceful solution, however remote it may seem .
