Mr W. P. Clifford, chairman, in con-
gratulating Limerick on their victory over
Cork, said that he did not wish to make any
remarks that might cause friction with
Cork, but those who made criticisms on
Limerick's play should read the reports of
the match in the Cork papers. On behalf
of the Limerick County Board he wished to
express sympathy with young Kelly, who
sustained a rather bad injury during the
match.

Mr T. Humphreys said he regretted that
Kelly's accident should have been used to
excuse the defeat of Cork, and he particu-
larly deplored the parade made of the
injured player for the edification of the
30,000 spectators. He also considered
that a person of the standing of Mr Sean
McCarthy, Chairman of the Cork Board,
should not be guilty of remarks which
were grossly unfair.
