LIMERICK-BORN MAN DEAD.

A Long Military Career.

A notable Irish personality in the Northern Highlands of Scotland has passed away in the person of Sergeant-Major Patrick Heffernan, a native of Limerick, who, after his retirement from Army service, settled down at Dingwall.

His military career goes back as far as 1878. He was often heard to relate how he came to join the British Army. When he was a mere lad in his native parish, on the outskirts of Limerick, he used to drive into the city with a donkey and cart supplying the shops with the produce of the farmer he worked for. At that time there was a Scottish Highland regiment stationed in the city, and he became fascinated with the kilt. "One fine day," he said, "after I had delivered my orders to the shops, I tied the old donkey to a lamp-post, made for the recruiting officer, took the Queen's shilling, and donned a kilt."

Sent out to India, he was with Lord Roberts in his famous Kabul-Kandahar march. He is survived by a widow, one son, and four daughters.
