**Accidental Death.**

**Fall Down Stairs.**

"That the deceased died as result of fracture of the skull accidentally received," was the verdict of the jury at the inquest held yesterday touching the death of William Williams (52), who fell down stairs at his home in Williams' Lane yesterday morning.

Evidence of identification was given by the deceased's wife, who stated that her husband was on night duty in the Corporation cleansing staff. It was a practice of his to return home for refreshments at about 2.30 a.m. each morning. On Tuesday night he left the house at 10 p.m. to go to work. She heard him return at about 2.30 a.m. and come up the stairs. When he got near the top she heard him fall down. With her daughter she ran out and saw him lying at the bottom of the stairs. They lifted him to the kitchen but he was unconscious and did not speak. Dr Roberts was then sent for.

Corroborative evidence was given by Christine Aberne, the deceased's daughter, and Francis Aberne, her husband, who resided in the house.

Dr S. McDonagh, Barrington's Hospital, stated that death in his opinion was due to fracture of the base of the skull.
