## TWO CHILDREN KILLED.

### Limerick Road Accidents.

A verdict of accidental death was returned at the inquest on James Lynch, aged 16 months, who sustained injuries near his home at Clonoughter, near Larkin's Cross, which later proved fatal. It appears that the child, the son of a labourer, toddled on to the road, where he came in contact with a hay float, by which he was knocked down. The driver of the float was exonerated from all blame.

At Kilmallock an inquest was held on Timothy Hickey (6), who when proceeding to school yesterday, received injuries from a car taking milk to the creamery, and died shortly afterwards. The jury found it was an unavoidable accident, exonerated the driver of the car from blame, and, stating that they considered the road very dangerous, and suggested improvements.
