A REMARKABLE WEED.

Bobbing up here and there in the waste places of the world is a weed of the same species as the potato. The slender erect stem, pointed oval leaves, and small round berries are often regarded with suspicion, hence the term "deadly" nightshade. However, it is only when animals chew the fresh leaves of this common or black nightshade or when people cat too many of its berries that injury results. In some warm climates the leaves are boiled and eaten as a kind of vegetable.

IN THE ARCTIC.

Seal hunting is an adventure providing many risks and dangers to those who take part. The sealing vessels are small, but are immensly strong to resist ice pressure. Each ship carries a complement of from 150 to 200 men. Their fathers and grandfathers have been sealers before them. It takes two or three generations to breed men fit to face the dangers and hardships of their life. At the first sign of fog or snow. up go the signal flags and the siren shrieks its warning. In the sealer "Newfoundland," one wild March morning, 119 men were caught "on ice" by an immense blind whiteness which raged for two days. Nearly hundred of that number died.

Another ever-present danger is that the sealing ships may be caught and crushed in the pack. In this way the sealer "Southern Cross" probably came to her end. She sank somewhere in the Arctic, carrying 177 men with her. Nothing more was ever seen of her, nor was any wreckage found, save a whaleboat picked up months later on the coast of Ireland.
