LATE DOWAGER LADY SEAFIELD.

Interred With Brother at Kilmallock.

The interment of the Dowager Countess
of Seafield, Langdale Gardens, Hove,
Sussex, daughter of the late Major George
Thomas Evans, of Ashill Towers, Kil-
mallock, took place last week in the
Evans family mausoleum at Kilmallock
Cemetery. The remains arrived at Limerick
on the morning mail train from Dun
Laoghaire, and were conveyed by motor
hearse to their last resting place, where
they were received by the Rector, the Rev.
Canon Sackville Taylor, who conducted the
Burial Service.

By the same train the remains of the
Countess's brother, Mr Trevor Corry Evans,
who died in 1927 in Sussex, where he was
temporarily buried, also arrived for reburial
in the mausoleum.

The chief mourners, who crossed from
England with the remains, were:—Lady
Nina Knowles, Devonshire, Lady Caroline
Ogvie Grant, Sussex (daughters); Mr
Savage Corry Evans, Lancashire (nephew);
Mrs Wallis Briggs (great grand-niece);
