T O - D A Y County Criminal

His Lordship Judge M continued the business of the to-day with the hearing of injury applications.
Bridget Ryan, Knock claimed £35 for injury on 24th July last, when a timber gate were alleged maliciously destroyed by fire.
Mr G. O. Cullinan, B.L. Mr A. J. Blood-Smyth, solicitor for the applicant, and Mr B.L. (instructed by Mr I solicitor), for Limerick County.
Mrs Ryan gave evidence that she retired to bed on the question at about 10 o'clock and raked out the fire. She was about 5.30 the following morning, and found that the fire had alight. She could give no evidence as to the fire occurred.
Edward Ryan, son of the applicant, gave evidence to show that in the car house the previous house was situated at the dwelling house. When he awoke in the morning the house was on fire with the aid of another man in putting it out. A gate in front of the house was also burned.
Sergeant Kenneally, O.P., gave evidence of examining the remains of the building in consequence of the fire received by him.
On behalf of the County the damage was estimated at £100.
A decree for £8 18s. 6d was made in favour of Edmund Ryan, Abane, alleged malicious damage to cart and harness on the 24th July last by the fire which broke out in the car house.
Bridget Ryan, the applicant, gave evidence in the case.
Having heard the evidence the case was dismissed with out costs.
