OBITUARY.

Captain J. D. Lyons, Croom House.

The death, which we announce with regret, took place suddenly at his residence, Croom House, Croom, at nine o'clock this morning of Captain James Denis Lyons, aged 58 years. The deceased gentleman was in the city yesterday, apparently in the best of health, but did not feel well on returning home. He was son of the late Mr Henry Lyons, D.L., Croom House, and served with distinction with his regiment, the 13th Hussars, in the South African War, and in the Great War. Captain Lyons was High Sheriff of the County in 1911, and was educated at the Jesuit College, Beaumont, Windsor, after which he entered the Army. He was a member of Limerick County Club and Limerick County Hunt, and in his early years a successful rider at point-to-point meetings. In this branch of sport he won several cups and other trophies. His death has been learned with deep regret in the County and City, and especially in Croom, where he was very popular. Five years ago Capt. Lyons suffered a heavy bereavement in the death of his wife. He is survived by a son and daughter, the former being at present resident in England.

The interment will take place at Croom at 12 o'clock on Thursday next.
