## LIMERICK MAN'S TRAGIC END.

Mr R. Cussen, Coroner for West Lime-  
 rick, and a jury held an inquest at Bally-  
 d'ohig, Newcastle West, into the circum-  
 stances connected with the death of John  
 Harnett, aged about 26, Ballyduhig, whose  
 body was recovered from a stream near his  
 house on Saturday.

Deceased recently returned from the  
 United States to settle some family affairs,  
 in connection with which he cycled to  
 Newcastle West on Thursday. He left  
 Newcastle West that evening about 6.30  
 p.m. and parted with a friend about three  
 miles from where the body was found. He  
 was not again seen alive, and as a result of  
 a search instituted by the Guards the body  
 was found in the stream.

Sergeant Holland, Newcastle West, con-  
 ducted the inquest, which was held in the  
 house of the deceased's brother-in-law at  
 Ballyduhig.

A verdict of death by drowning was  
 recorded.
