## ECONOMIC PLANNING."

In the course of his address Professor O'Connell stated that prior to the 20th century a planned economy was practised in crude form. The conditions that influenced the development of the social methods and the powerful financial and industrial complexities of the modern age have changed the position to-day in regard to unemployment, the lecturer said in favour of any Economic Planning which would be controlled by Civil Servants and not by politicians.
