**DEATH OF LIMERICK PRIEST.**

We regret to announce the death of Rev. Father John Berchmans Kelly, C.C., St. Michael's, Limerick, which occurred at a Cork nursing home on Sunday. A son of Mr and Mrs James Kelly, Bosnets-town, Kilfinane. Father Kelly was a member of a well-known and much respected family, and during his brief career as a priest won widespread esteem by his devotion to duty and his amiable disposition.

He was educated at St. Munchin's and ordained at Maynooth in 1927. Beginning his ministry as curate at Ardpatrick, he was subsequently appointed to Parteen, where he laboured for four years, and later was transferred to St. Michael's, to which he was attached for the past three years.

His health began to fail during the summer, and he had been seriously ill for the last few months. His death at the early age of 33 will arouse deep sympathy for his bereaved parents, his brothers, Rev. Father James Kelly, C.C., Granagh, Co. Limerick, and Dr Maurice Kelly, New Zealand, and other relatives.
