Up to a few years ago it was incumbent, under an old statute, on the authorities to hand over all fines to the Corporation. The money, which usually aggregated £300 a year, went towards the relief of the rates, and helped to keep the Courthouse in repair and to heat and light the building. New legislation deprived the city of this revenue, which now falls to the State. At the time the Bill was going through the Dail a vigorous protest was made by the Corporation in defence of a privilege embodied in an o'd charter. The protest proved to be of no avail, and the Corporation, as well as losing a source of revenue, must, out of the rates, maintain the Courthouse building.
