The Coal-Cattle Pact, which was reached last January, provided for mutual benefits in trade between the United Kingdom and the Free State. The latter, in turn, was to increase the quota for cattle imports from the Free State by 33 1-3 per cent. An official British statement issued at the time expressed the view that increased coal trade would absorb 5,000 miners in full employment, and that the Free State would buy 1,250,000 tons more coal from the United Kingdom.
