A Native of County Limerick

His many friends will learn with regret of the death of Rev. Rudolph McCarthy, O.F.M., which occurred on Wednesday at the Capuchin Monastery, Carlton Road, Irish Road.

He was a native of Dromcolloher, county Limerick, and received his early education at Charleville Christian Brothers' School. Thence he entered the Capuchin Novitiate in Phantasagh, as a member of the English Province.

He was recognized as a gifted preacher, and was requisitioned for several missions throughout England, preaching several times in London.
