

A Fatal Bathe.

Nurse's Tragic Visit to Ballybunion.

Drowned While on Holiday.

Miss Peggy McCarthy, 23, Strand, Newcastle West, a member of the nursing staff attached to St. Vincent's Hospital, Dublin, was drowned at Ballybunion at about five o'clock on Friday evening.

The deceased had spent portion of her holidays at Ballybunion, but had left her home at Strand, some days previous to the tragedy. Accompanied by a younger sister she arrived in Listowel on Friday, where, after visiting some friends, she left for Ballybunion, with the intention of returning on the same evening to attend a dance at Listowel.

Both sisters went for a bathe at a spot close to the Black Rocks. A very strong tide was running at the time, and deceased, who was evidently a good swimmer, was misled by her sister, who raised the alarm.

Mr Con Keane, a chemist's clerk, of Listowel, secured a lifebuoy and ran to the scene. Handing the short rope to some men who had gathered at the spot, he dived himself of his clothing and struck out in the direction in which the victim had last been seen. Having swum around for some time he found the girl in a dazed condition. Experiencing some difficulty in bringing her ashore, he succeeded in keeping her afloat until the arrival of a rowing boat manned by two men.

Keane and the girl, who was still alive, were hauled into the boat, and all seemed well until a short distance from the shore. The boat was struck by a heavy swell and capsized, throwing all the occupants out.

The unfortunate girl was swept out to sea and drowned.
