Mr Con Keane, a chemist's clerk, of Listowel, secured a lefebuoy and ran to the scene. Handing the short rope to some men who had gathered at the spit, he divested himself of his clothing and struck out in the direction in which the victim had of last been seen. Having swum around for some time he found the girl in a dazed condition. Experiencing some difficulty in bringing her ashore, he successed in keeping her affoat until the arrival of a rowing

boat manned by two men. Keane and the girl, who was still alive, were bauled into the boat, and all seemed well until a short distance from the shore The boat was struck by a heavy swell and capsized, throwing all the occupants out.

The opfortunate girl was swept out to . sea and drowned.
