DEATH OF MR. FRANK W. MCCARTHY.

The death, which we regret to announce, occurred at his residence in New York on Sunday, of Mr Frank W. McCarthy after an illness of some duration. His untimely death is mourned by a wide circle of friends in the home of his adoption and by many who knew him in this city. Sincere sympathy will be extended to his wife and family and mother in the bereavement that has befallen them, and to his cousin, Mr Joe McCarthy.

INFANT'S SUDDEN DEATH.

A three month old infant, the child of Thomas Darcy, 10 Davis street, Limerick, was found dead in bed on Monday morning. The body was removed to Barrington's Hospital for the purpose of a post mortem to have the cause of death ascertained.

Following the examination, Dr. S. McDonagh, house surgeon, Barrington's Hospital issued a certificate showing that there was no evidence of external injury on the body, and death in his opinion was caused by asphyxia, due to an enlarged thymus gland.

As a result, the Coroner did not consider an inquest necessary.

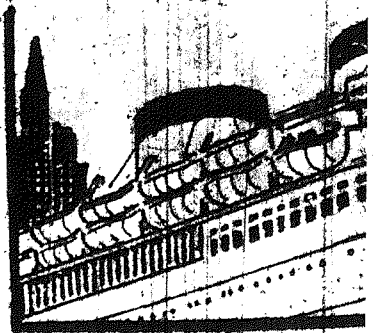

Committees' Interview With Minister.

A meeting of the Caherline (County Wick) Drainage Scheme Committee, was read from Mr Robert Ryan, stating that, accompanied by Bourke and Crowley, T.D.'s, they interviewed with Mr Hugo Flinn, in connection with the proposed drainage of Caherline Bog. Mr Flinn pointed out the nature of the undertaking of a scheme, where the County Council would not contribute towards the cost, and where no contribution would be forthcoming from the owners whose lands would be improved by drainage, was setting up a very unusual precedent. He (Mr Ryan) stated that the question of the drainage bog would be undertaken one way or the other.

The meeting decided to adjourn consideration of the letter to a future meeting.
