MOTOR ACCIDENT

Settlement in C Damage

A settlement was announced by Justice O'Byrne, in the High Court, yesterday, in an action by Kelly, commercial traveller, 100, St. Laurence Road, Dublin, claimed damages of £100 from Laurence and Denis Cusack, Grove, Clontarf, in respect of injuries sustained by the plaintiff on October 10, 1935, in Clare Street when a motor car owned by Laurence Cusack, and driven by Denis Cusack, which the plaintiff was riding with an electric lamp, struck the plaintiff.

The consent, which provided for payment to the plaintiff of £100 damages and £40 costs, was approved by Justice O'Byrne, and made absolute.

Mr M. Binchy, K.C., appeared for the plaintiff, and Mr. T. O'Connell, K.C., and Mr. P. J. Nugent, K.C., appeared for the defendants, by Mr. Thos. A. O'Reilly, solicitor.
