

In County Limerick.

Two fatal accidents occurred in Co. Limerick on Monday night in the snow storm. While William Hartigan, a labourer, and his daughter, were returning to their home at Clarina from the city they were struck and knocked down by a motor car. At the time each was wheeling a bicycle, and they were severely injured. The father died in the County Hospital, Croom, on Wednesday, and the daughter is at present under medical care. The deceased was employed by a city firm.

John O'Dwyer, an elderly man, employed at Mungret College, was struck on Monday night, while walking along the road near Mungret village, by a cyclist, who rode away and has not since been traced. He received head injuries to which he succumbed, and at an inquest a verdict of accidental death was returned.

OVER-PRODUCTION OF FLOUR.

Milling to be Suspended.

The Limerick City Roller Flour Mill, owned by Messrs Rank (Ireland) Ltd., is to suspend operations as from next Wednesday. Notices to that effect were displayed in the building, and it was learned that the action taken was due to slackness of business. It is stated that upwards of 100 men will be affected, and in the course of an interview Mr J. P. Goodbody, managing director, said it was found necessary to suspend milling, as there were at present considerable stocks on hands. When the surplus supplies were exhausted the mills would re-open.
