ment should break off trade relations with Spain until such time as the persecution of Catholics ceased there.

A POLITICAL ATMOSPHERE.

Mr. Madden said he was very sorry a political atmosphere had been introduced into the discussion. The matter was fully discussed a month ago, and the Council were unanimous in expressing their feelings and temper in the matter. He considered it both tactless and injudicious of Mr. Walsh to introduce the name of Mr. Cosgrave into the discussion, because such things tended to bitterness and illfeeling that could be easily avoided. He did not agree that there were no Communists in the Free State, in view of the fact that Communist candidates in the Dublin Municipal elections secuered over 1.000 votes. Furthermore, he strongly objected to a statement made recently by a responsible Ministr to the effect that when the people of the Free State signified by their vote that they wanted a Communist Government, then a Communist Government would go into power, in accordance wih democratic principles.

APPEAL FOR WITHDRAWAL.

In conclusion, Mr. Madden made a strong appeal to Mr. O'Connell to withdraw his resolution, and allow instead a resolution to be unanimously passed expressing sympathy with the Church and Patriots in Spain.

TO ADVANCE OUR INTERESTS.

The Chairman said he was very sorry that he did not rule the resolution out of order. As far as he could see, Spain was only mentioned once in a lengthy document coming from people who were trying to advance their own cause.

Mr. O'Connell said he was prepared to withdraw his resolution if a resolution was passed requesting the Government to break off trade relations with Spain.

Mr. McCarthy said the entire matter could be safely left in the hands of Mr. de Valera and the Irish Hierarchy.

RESULT OF VOTE.

A vote was then taken for and against the resolution. By 14 votes to eight the resolution was marked "read."

Two members did not vote.

Mr. Madden then handed in a notice that he would move a resolution of sym pathy with the Patriot Forces at next meeting.

REPAIRS TO BOREENS.

The Council then considered a letter from the General Council of County Councils, asking that the Council would send forward any resolutions they wished discussed at the general meeting in Decl ember.

After some discussion, a resolution was passed, on the proposition of Mr. Madder, seconded by Mr. McCarthy, asking that as far as possible all grants for relief works during the coming year be devoted to the repairs of boreens and culs-de-sage.

UNIVERSITY SCHOLARSHIPS.

A letter was read from the Secondary Teachers of the County Limerick protesing against the action of the Limerick County Council in failing to provide University Scholarships for the poor children of the County Limerick.

Mr. McCarthy said that the matter would have to be discussed at a future meeting.

No action was taken.

VEHICLE BUILDERS' DEMANDS.

A letter was read from the Limerick Branch of the Irish Vehicle Builders' Union asking the support of the Coundil in their agitation to have the repairs omnibuses carried out as heretofore

CARPENTER'S DEATH.

Fatal Accident in Limerick Building.

Dr. D. A. McErlean. Dublin City Coroner, with a jury, yesterday held an inguest in the Richmond Hospital, Dublin, into the circumstances of the death of Patrick Phillips (30), carpenter, 50 St. Joseph's Place, Dublin, who died in the hospital on Wednesday following an accident in the La Moderne, Patrick Street, Limerick, on September 22. Deceased was in the employment of Messrs. O'Connor and Bailey, shopfitters, Dublin, by whom he was sent to Limerick.

Dr. Berney, house surgeon, Richmond Hospital stated that death was due to shock following a fracture of the spinal column.

Kenneth Web, a shop fitter, Merrion Square, stated that while the deceased was walking across the shop he fell through the floor into the basement, a distance of about nine feet. At the time he deceased was carrying a piece of wood when a portion of the floor shuttering gave way.

In reply to Inspector Sheppard, witness shid it was a temporary floor placed there while the shop front was being constructed.

To Mr. Gaynor (solicitor for next-of kin) -- The temporary floor was not well supported, and after the accident the timber appeared to be weak.

Mr. Denis Hardiman. contractor. Limerick said it was not usual for workmen to walk on a floor of this kind, which was there for a particular purpose. He was of opinion that the deceased walked heavily on the floor and the support gave way.

To the Coroner-I mainain that the temporary floor was in good condition.

The jury found in accordance with the medical evidence, and arred that they had not sufficient evidence to attach blame to anybody.

CITY WORKER'S DEATH.

Injured by Lift.

The Inquest.

The death ook place on Thursday evening in Barrington's Hospital of Patrick Griffin, Cathedral Place, who was injured on the premises of Messrs. J. and G. Boyd, Limerick, where he was employed as a packer, on Saturday last.

It is understood that the deceased put his head through a ventilation hole beside a lift, and was struck on the head by weights when the lift was descending.

Mr. J. S. McNeice. Coroner, opened an inquest a Barrington's Hospital yeserday.

Evidence of identificaion was given by James Griffin, step-brother, who stated that the deceased was 30, years of age and married.

Dr. S. McDonagh, House Surgeon, Barrington's Hospital, stated that he deceased was admitted on Saturday last suffering from head and face injuries. He died on Thursday, and a post-mortem examination disclosed fracure of the lower jaw and congestion of the lungs following injuries received.
